"Is Anything Too Wonderful for the LORD?"

Genesis 18:1-15

CONTEXT

- 1. This is the beginning of the end of Abraham's 25-year ordeal of waiting for a promised son.
- 2. Abraham and Sarah have come to the end of their resources.
- 3. Sarah is not convinced the promised son is possible—she is 90 years old!
- 4. The LORD and two angels arrive as unexpected guests. v.1

ABRAHAM'S HOSPITALITY FOR UNEXPECTED GUESTS. v.2-8

- 1. Abraham took the initiative TO WELCOME them. v.2
 - He looked first; he made eye contact. He lifted up his eyes and looked...
 - He initiated interaction; he approached them. When he saw them, he ran from the tent door to meet them...
 - He was humble and gracious; he bowed down. ...and bowed himself to the earth...

2. Abraham took the initiative TO SPEAK WITH them. v.3-5

- He initiated the conversation; he spoke first. v.3
- He invited the guests to have fellowship with him. Do not pass by...but rest here for a while...
- He tried to make them comfortable. v.4, 5 ...rest yourselves...! will bring bread...refresh yourselves...
- He expected nothing in return. v.5 ...and after that you may pass on...

3. Abraham chose TO SERVE them. v.6-8

- He hurried (v.6) and ran (v.7) in the heat of the day (v.1).
- He provided a meal at his expense. v.6-8a ... three seahs of fine flour...a choice calf from the herd...
- He served them and 'waited' on them. v.8b ...And he stood by them under the tree while they ate.

GOD'S MIRACULOUS PROMISE TO ABRAHAM AND SARAH. v.9-15

1. This visit seems aimed at Sarah. v.9-10

- The visitors ask specifically for her. v.9
- The LORD repeats the promise of a son within her hearing. v.10; Ref. 17:16

2. Sarah laughs to herself when she hears the promise firsthand. v.11-12

- She looked at their age and ability—rather than the promise and power of the LORD. v.11
- She laughed to herself. v.12

3. The LORD spoke to Abraham regarding Sarah's response. 13-15

- He asked Abraham's about his wife's laughter: "Why did Sarah laugh and say...?" v.13
- Key Verse: v.14: "Is anything too hard for the LORD?" Ref. Jer 32:17, 27
- The LORD confronted Sarah about her laugh—and she lied. v.15
- Note: 1 Peter 3:5-6 (The only time we see Sarah call Abraham "lord" is in this text.)

APPLICATIONS: Why should we actively reach out and welcome others?

- 1. Evangelism & Discipleship: We are commanded to—and God's Spirit often prompts us to do so.
 - Matthew 28:26-28. E.g., Philip in Acts 8:29f

2. Because Israel used to be strangers in a foreign land.

- \rightarrow Why did Moses include these verses? (Genesis 18:1-8) Ref. Gen. 15:13; Exodus 22:21; 23:9
- 3. Blessing often comes to the one who reaches out and welcomes guests.
 - Hebrews 13:2: Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares.

4. Looking out for guests and strangers is looking out for Jesus.

- Matthew 25:40: Whatever you did for the least of these...you did for Me.
- 5. Because God welcomed us into His household through faith in His Son Jesus Christ.
 - We once were not only 'strangers' to God and His household—but enemies.
 Romans 5:8-10; Ephesians 2:12-13
