# Reversals (Esther 5:1-14)

#### Reversals

- On the very day when the enemies of the Jews hoped to gain the mastery over them, the reverse occurred (Es 9:1)
- This verse serves as a clue from the narrator on how to interpret what is unfolding
- What unfolds over the next few chapters will be a sequence of **reversals**

# Esther enters the king's presence uninvited (5:1-5)

- Esther thoughtfully prepares to enter the king's presence
- **Reversal:** Vashti was banished for not coming when called for, Esther is going to enter king's presence even though she had not been called for
- Xerxes is pleased to see Esther and welcomes her
- With him offering her the scepter, her life is safe, positively resolving one of our outstanding issues (how will the king respond to Esther entering uninvited?)
- Queen, not criminal
  - o **Reversal:** Esther is received not as a criminal, but as the queen
- Queen Esther
  - Up till now, Esther referred to as "Esther"
  - o Starting here in 5:3, term "Queen Esther" used 16 times in remainder of story
- Xerxes' offer
  - o Xerxes not only receives Esther, but he also makes her an offer
  - o "What is it, Queen Esther? What is your request? It shall be given to you, even to the half of my kingdom?" (Es 5:3)
- Esther's invitation
  - o Esther invites her husband, the king (Xerxes) and Haman, to a feast
  - Her invite: "If it please the king..." (5:4)
- King accepts Esther's dinner invitation

## Esther's Feast: Take One (5:6-8)

- King again offers up to half his kingdom to Esther
- Note: Observe the parallel structure between his offer and his response
  - o "What is your **wish**? ... What is your **request**? ..." (5:6)
    - "*My wish* and my *request* is..." (5:7)
    - "If it please the king to grant my **wish** and fulfill my **request**..." (5:8)
- Esther appears ready to share her request, then changes midstream
- Instead, she invites both Xerxes and Haman back for another party the next night

## Haman Plots Against Mordecai (5:9-14)

- Haman left the party on cloud 9
- That delight is short lived as he is filled with anger when he sees Mordecai
- Haman follows his great party by throwing himself a pity party
- "This idea pleased Haman" (5:14) of course it did!

"Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need." (Hebrews 4:16)
