# "God's Messenger"

Mark 1:1-8

## THE BEGINNING OF THE GOSPEL, v.1

- 1. "Gospel" means good news or glad tidings. We use the word 'gospel' in 2 ways...
  - There are gospel books in the New Testament (Matthew, Mark, Luke & John).
  - There is a gospel 'message' we believe and share with others. I.e., "sharing the gospel"
- 2. Mark links "the gospel" with a name: Jesus Christ, the Son of God.
  - The good news has to do with a man: Jesus.
  - The good news has to do with an 'anointed' man: Christ. aka. "the Messiah"
  - The good news has to do with a divine man: the Son of God.
- 3. The word "gospel" was not first used by Christians.
  - In the ancient world, "gospel" meant "an historical event which introduced a new situation for the world."
  - Among Romans it was used in association with emperor worship.

## PROPHESIED IN THE OLD TESTAMENT. v.2-3

- The 'beginning' of the gospel of Jesus Christ is rooted in the OT.
- 1. Malachi 3:1: Behold, I send my messenger, and he will prepare the way before me....
- **2. Isaiah 40:3:** A voice cries: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD; make straight in the desert a highway for our God."
  - This messenger's ministry would be in the wilderness and would be a ministry of proclamation: 'Prepare the way of the LORD. Make His paths straight." → Get ready for the LORD!
  - Isaiah 40 symbolically pictures the LORD leading the Jews out of captivity in Babylon.
- → Application: READ Isaiah ch. 40-43 through the lens of both God's promise and power to deliver you from sin.

### JOHN IS THE "MESSENGER". v.4-6

- 1. John appeared, baptizing and proclaiming in the wilderness. v.4 Ref. Luke 1:36; Genesis 15:6
  - Baptizing and proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.
  - Better understanding: 'a baptism arising out of repentance' or 'a baptism from repentance'.
- 2. God was working revival in many people in the surrounding areas. v.5
  - All the country of Judea and Jerusalem were going out to the wilderness to be baptized by John.
  - They were being baptized and confessing their sins. (Lit. to confess publicly, to avow openly their sin)
- 3. John lived a 'wilderness' lifestyle and ministry. v.6 Ref. Proverbs 1:23; 28:13
  - John's clothes were made of camel hair. He wore a leather belt.
  - His diet consisted of locusts and wild honey. → Why is Mark telling us this?
    - 1. His clothing and lifestyle echo Elijah the prophet. 2 Kings 1:8; Jesus says explicitly in 9:9-13.
    - 2. They show John's character and his radical commitment to follow God. Ref. Luke 7:24-35.
- → Walking in God's ways takes courage, self-denial, sacrifice, and going without.
- → The way for Jesus is prepared by starting with sin. Confession, repentance. See Luke 3:18-20 in its context.

## ANOTHER ONE IS COMING.... v.7-8

- 1. One coming after me will be greater. v.7
  - He has more might. He is more worthy. 'I am not even worthy to untie the strap of his sandals'
- 2. One coming after me will have a greater ministry. v.8
  - 'I have baptized you with water, but He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit'

## 2 Closing applications:

- 1. Historical context: Mark was likely written during or just after Nero's brutal persecution of Christians.
- 2. Consider God's record of working in the wilderness. Ref. Isaiah 42:1-4
  - a theme in Mark's prologue. vs. 3,4,12,13
